Theme: Community | Classroom Activity

Job Posting

- This activity is appropriate for independent work, pairs, or small group work collaboration.
- Adjust the activity according to the needs of your individual students by assigning specific roles for pair or group work.

Steps

- 1. Have the students work individually, in pairs, or in a small group to research the job requirements and responsibilities for one of following jobs listed below within a community (or brainstorm your own list).
- 2. Have each student or group create a job posting for the job using the template provided. Include any educational or training requirements and experience required and include two (2) facts about the job.
 - medical professional
 - landscaper
 - home builder or realtor
 - waste/trash removal worker
 - banker
 - retailer
 - teacher
 - restaurant worker
 - · firefighter or police officer
 - repair person
- 3. Before having the students begin their work, discuss what is meant by the terms "educational or training requirements" and "experience required."
- 4. You may also want to brainstorm other community members and their jobs or roles within your specific community.
- 5. Have each student or group share their job posting with the class and discuss how that job is important to the community.

Theme: Community | Home Activity

Our class is learning about the many types of jobs that are important in a community with literacy resources from Reading Is Fundamental (RIF). To deepen their understanding of this concept, we suggest you complete this activity with your child.

My Community

- If there is a family member who is a community helper, start by interviewing that family member.
- If not, interview a neighbor, a family friend, or find a community helper to learn how they came to be a part of your community and ask them to share their favorite three things about how their job supports the community.

Steps

- 1. Talk with your child and decide on a member of the community or neighbor who would be a good candidate for the interview. (We recommend an adult makes the request, sets up the interview, and participates during the interview.)
- 2. Help your child prepare a page for the interview questions with space for notes:
 - How did you come to live and work in this neighborhood?
 - What are your three favorite things about your work in the community?
- 3. Encourage your child to talk more with the interviewee and perhaps compare favorite things.
- 4. After the interview, help your child write a thank you note to the interviewee.
- 5. If your child is interested, encourage them to ask more people what they love about their role(s) in the community. Consider keeping a running list of great things about the community on your refrigerator or somewhere else in the house that will serve as an easy reminder of the many wonderful roles that individuals play to create a productive and happy community.
