Theme: Celebration | Classroom Activity

Around The World Show & Tell

- 1. Invite your students to bring in an item from home that is special to their family and/or culture.
- 2. Have students sit in a circle and take turns telling everyone about their item. Consider questions such as:
 - What did you bring in for show and tell?
 - · How is this item special to you and your family?
 - Tell us the story of how you got this item!
- 3. After all students have shared, discuss any similarities and differences discovered during the activity. Encourage students to continue to discuss their items with classmates throughout the day and refer to the connections made in other lessons and conversations.





Theme: Celebration | Home Activity

Our class is learning about celebration with literacy resources from Reading Is Fundamental. Complete this activity with your child to help deepen their understanding of celebration.

Secret Celebration

Celebrations don't have to be big to be meaningful. In this activity, you and your child will have the opportunity to design a secret (i.e., personal) celebration that just your family shares.

Steps

- 1. Talk to your child about what they've learned about celebration in class.
- 2. Think about and discuss all the small things that can be celebrated in a day (e.g., getting to school on time, the warmth of the sun or a cool breeze, learning a new word).
- 3. Design a special way of celebrating together that no one else might see or understand.

 Maybe choose a particular song you hum or whistle or an original exclamation similar to yay!
- 4. Look for ways to use your new celebration through the days and weeks to come. And make some time for more involved celebrations for the bigger things.
